

15 Successful Years Celebrated

Record Turnout at ICF's Annual Meeting and Luncheon

Over 600 members and friends of the Idaho Community Foundation packed the ballroom of the Doubletree Riverside Hotel in Boise on May 5th to celebrate ICF's first 15 years of growth and the rich array of community projects supported by the Foundation. Sponsored by U.S. Bank, attendance at this year's event increased 95%, setting an all-time record for the Foundation. While the event was a time of celebration and making connections, it was also an opportunity to bid a fond farewell to retiring President and CEO Alice Hennessey and to welcome her successor, Cathy Silak. John Fery, former CEO of Boise Cascade and ICF's founding chairman, delivered the keynote address.

Coordinating a luncheon meeting for over 600 attendees is no small task. The Annual Luncheon Steering Committee (also known as the "Dream Team"), chaired by Karla Bodnar of Boise (see photo on page 8), rose to the occasion as it worked tirelessly over the months to help make this a signature event for the Foundation. They made plans and contingency plans for absolutely everything—the food... the music... the flower arrangements... the silent auction... everything, except... the power

Idaho Women's Charitable Foundation Fund Grants \$35,000 to Community Projects

The Idaho Women's Charitable Foundation (IWCF) has awarded its 2004 grants to two organizations in the Treasure Valley. \$20,000 was granted to the Idaho Humane Society in Boise to support the Prison Pet Partnership Program, which pairs shelter dogs in need of training and socialization with inmates at the Idaho Correctional Center who care for, groom and teach the dogs obedience skills.

In addition to the Humane Society grant, \$15,000 was awarded to the Bollinger Christofferson Foundation's Lucrary Dental Clinic in Boise to help purchase equipment urgently

needed to maintain operations and continue the quality of services offered by the clinic, which provides services for people who are uninsured. The grant will also help support the "Open Wide the Doors 2004" project - a program aimed at opening the clinic 25 additional days during 2004 to meet the growing needs of the community and shorten a long waiting list, enabling the clinic to provide dental care for 150-200 more patients during the year.

IWCF was created to expand the number of women involved in philanthropy in Idaho and to demonstrate the impact that pooled

monies can have in bringing positive change to our communities. Members commit to three years of a \$1000 annual contribution. Half this amount is pooled and allocated for projects researched and chosen by the group. The other half is available for individual gift designations. Through a unique partnership with IWCF, the Idaho Community Foundation administers the funds. IWCF President Susan Smith noted, "As individuals, we would not be able to attack these situations, but together, we are able to support these endeavors which are strategic and compassionate."

Committee and has provided public relations and marketing support for ICF over the past two years. Karla has moved on to become the Executive Director of Ballet Idaho. We're sorry to see her go, and wish her well as she embarks on her new career.

Power crisis averted, ICF Board Chairman Dolores Chapman then welcomed the audience, reporting that "today, the Foundation is in very good shape," and shared highlights of the past year:

- The 2004 Friend of the Foundation Award was given to Alice Hennessey to honor her many years of commitment to ICF (see article on page 7).
- ICF welcomed new President, Cathy Silak (see article on page 5).
- Total assets were \$48.6 million at year-end, up about \$8 million over 2003, consisting of about 300 individual funds established by donors.
- Distributions in 2003 totaled \$3.3 million for worthwhile charitable projects.
- ICF reached a grant making milestone: As of year-end, over \$20

million has been awarded in grants and distributions since ICF's founding in 1988.

- ICF achieved a 26.8% positive return on our investment portfolio, exceeding benchmarks in each asset class.
- Over 1,000 members, statewide.
- Board of Directors was expanded from 17 to 22 members to provide better geographic coverage of Idaho.
- Doug Chadderdon, Coeur d'Alene, Diane Plastino Graves, Boise, and Ron Sali, Boise were elected to the Board (see "New to the Foundation" story on page 11).

Re-elected to the Board were: from ICF's Northern Region—John Bennett, Kooskia; Duane Jacklin, Post Falls; Nancy Sue Wallace, Hayden; from the Eastern Region—Dan Keller, Preston; Doug Nelson, Idaho Falls; Paul Yochum, Pocatello; and from the Southwestern Region—Sandy Fery, Boise, Judge Bill Hart, Buhl; Brad Little, Emmett; John Rosholt, Twin Falls.

In his keynote address, John Fery, who served as ICF's founding Chairman for eight years, paid

tribute to the people, including Alice Hennessey, and organizations who helped the Foundation become firmly established in its early years. State Senator Brad Little then presented Alice with a Certificate of Achievement from Governor Kempthorne commemorating her accomplishment of having visited all of Idaho's 44 counties, and announced, "For all those countless miles and weeks and years of dedication, Governor Kempthorne has officially declared this "Alice Hennessey Day in the State of Idaho." He then added that the Board of Directors voted to establish the Alice E. Hennessey Greatest Need Fund (see page 7 for additional information on the fund). The Board also presented a token of appreciation to Alice at a dinner the previous evening - an Archie B. Teater painting that hung on the wall in her office, and one that she especially admired over the years.

ICF's new Chairman, Duane Jacklin, thanked Dolores Chapman for her years of service to the Foundation, first as a member of

A Message From ICF President Cathy Silak

My first two months as President and CEO of the Idaho Community Foundation have been busy and exciting. The Annual Meeting and

Luncheon on May 5, 2004 was a wonderful opportunity for me to meet many of the ICF family of donors, members, agencies, and supporters. Alice Hennessey received the Friend of the Foundation Award, and was recognized in the inspirational speech of ICF's Founding Board Member John Fery. Not one to bask in the glow of compliments and to rest on her laurels, Alice worked diligently for almost a month after the lunch so that my transition would be smooth, and she continues to be a valuable resource to me and the Board of Directors.

The North Idaho Grant Awards tour was my first opportunity to really experience first-hand the incredible impact that the grant making of ICF has on the communities of Idaho. ICF hosted five events, in Sandpoint, Post Falls, Wallace, Moscow and Grangeville, and at each one Craig Parry and I were delighted to see so many grant recipients, donors, members, elected officials and community leaders. Even the venues of these events show the range of ICF's grant making: at Post Falls we were in the Old Church, which is being refurbished into a community center through the efforts of leaders like Susan Jacklin (wife of ICF's current Board Chair Duane Jacklin); in Moscow, we were hosted by St. Mary's Parish, and in Grangeville, at the Syringa Hospital Annex.

Special thanks go to everyone who worked on these events and to our generous sponsors, J.D. Lumber,

U.S. Bank, Harry Magnuson, and Sterling Savings Bank. I was especially grateful for the home-baked cookies at St. Mary's Parish.

At each event, the grant recipients explained how the grant would enable them to enrich their communities. The spirit of giving of these North Idaho residents was evident—most of the grant recipients explained that their program or agency depends heavily on volunteer support. A couple of examples of the positive change the grants accomplish stand out for me. At the lunch at the Wallace Inn, a teenage girl expressed her thanks for the new home that she and her family now have, thanks to their own efforts and the support of Habitat for Humanity. In Moscow, Carmen O'Hara told of plans to install handicapped-accessible playground equipment at the Orofino elementary school. The school children wanted this playground structure so that one of the classmates, a boy who has no arms and legs, could enjoy recess!

It is a real pleasure to come to work each morning in the beautiful historic home owned by the Foundation. When you are nearby, please stop in and we'll give you a tour of the house, which celebrates its hundredth anniversary this year!

ICF Board Approves Over \$889,000 in Non-Competitive Distributions

The Idaho Community Foundation has three regional grant cycles every year, covering the Northern, Eastern, and Southwestern regions of Idaho. These cycles are competitive in nature, with prospective grant recipients submitting an on-line application that is reviewed by volunteer regional advisory panels. The panel members make recommendations for funding to the ICF Board of Directors. However, this is not the only way that grant distributions are made.

The Foundation also makes grants throughout the year from a variety of funds that are not open for general

applications. Many of these funds support organizations and charitable projects specified by the fund donor or recommended by individual or family fund advisors.

Occasionally, donor advised funds make distributions based on an application process not tied to ICF's regular competitive grant cycles. Notification of these grant programs is done through local media, ICF's newsletters, and our website at

www.idcomfdn.org/grants.htm.

At its first two meetings this year (February and May), the Board of

Directors approved distributions totaling over \$889,000 from the various funds not linked to ICF's competitive grant cycles (including advised, donor-designated, scholarship, agency, operating, and special project funds). These distributions positively affected a wide range of nonprofit programs and activities throughout Idaho and a few beyond its borders. A complete list of the recipients of grants and distributions is published each year in the Foundation's annual report and is available on our website.

A Profile of ICF's New Chairman

The Idaho Community Foundation Board of Directors elected Post Falls business leader Duane Jacklin as its new Chairman during the May annual meeting, succeeding Dolores Chapman of McCall.

"This is the first time in the foundation's 15-year history that a Board member from North Idaho has assumed the organization's chairmanship," said Cathy Silak, President and CEO of the Foundation. "While we have had a chairman from Eastern Idaho, Park Price of Pocatello, the election of Duane Jacklin to the chairmanship underscores the Foundation's commitment to serve the entire state."

Born in Spokane, Washington, Duane has made Idaho his home for the past 26 years. He is a managing partner of Riverbend Commerce Park, Riverbend Hospitality and the Jacklin Land Company. As the past president of Jacklin Seed, he guided the company's growth from a small, local seed company into a major producer of turf grass seed with domestic and international distribution. In 1997, the J.R. Simplot Company acquired Jacklin Seed.

A graduate of Washington State and Purdue Universities, Duane is noted for his public service and

ongoing contributions to the state of Idaho. He serves on the Boards of Washington Trust Bank, and Empire Airlines, as well as the Advisory Board of the Department of Labor and Commerce. He also served as Chairman of the Idaho Association

of Commerce and Industry and has been active in the Boy Scouts for many years. An ICF Director since 1998, Duane has strengthened the Foundation by serving on the Executive, Investment, Investment Study, and Nominating Committees. Duane is married to Susan and they have a son, Taggart. Known by his friends and colleagues for his balanced view of life, Duane pursues his favorite pastimes, which include fishing, hunting, gardening and golf.

Cathy Silak Named President and CEO of ICF

Cathy R. Silak took the reins of the Idaho Community Foundation (ICF) in May as its new President and CEO, succeeding Alice Hennessey, who retired June 1st. Leading ICF into the future will be no small task. Thankfully, Cathy is no stranger to challenges. She was the first woman appointed appellate judge in Idaho's history (in 1990), appointed to the Idaho Supreme Court in 1993, and subsequently became the Court's Vice-Chief Justice in 1997. She is the author of hundreds of legal opinions now comprising Idaho law. In 2001, Cathy resumed her partnership at Hawley Troxell Ennis and Hawley, Boise, where her practice focused on corporate governance and intellectual property law for emerging and established businesses. She also specialized in health law and employment law for the for-profit, nonprofit and governmental sectors.

Originally from New York, Cathy graduated from New York University, earned a Master's Degree in City

Planning from Harvard University, her Law Degree from the University of California at Berkeley, and a Master of Laws Degree from the University of Virginia. Her marriage to attorney Nicholas G. Miller brought her to Idaho in 1983. Nick and Cathy, who reside in Boise, have three children, Hartley, Martha and Michael Miller.

In addition to her professional accomplishments, the ICF Board of Directors was particularly impressed by Cathy's commitment and passion for building community. Serving on numerous nonprofit boards, including St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, the Idaho Youth Ranch Foundation, and Project Safe Place of the Bannock Youth Foundation, has helped her recognize and address the diverse needs of communities throughout the state.

Alice Hennessey Honored as ICF's 2004 Friend of the Foundation

ICF's most significant honor is its Friend of the Foundation award. At the Foundation's May Annual Meeting and Luncheon, the award was presented to ICF's retiring President and CEO, Alice

on its first Board of Directors. For over seven years, the Foundation prospered under her direction. During her tenure, membership grew from about 150 to well over 1,000. The number of funds in the Foundation more than doubled to about 300. Total assets quadrupled to \$48.6 million at year-end 2003. During her tenure as CEO, the Foundation developed a much stronger presence throughout Idaho.

Alice has a long history of service, not only to the Foundation, but also to the community. Currently a Director of St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, Alice has also served as chairman of the Boise Area Chamber of Commerce and the Ada County United Way, just to name a few. She has received numerous other awards, including the National YWCA Tribute to Women and Industry, Boise March of Dimes White Rose Award, and the Chamber of Commerce Award for Outstanding Community Service. She was named one of America's 85 top executive women by Industry Week magazine in 1985, and was named one of the 100 top corporate women by Business Week in 1976.

All of us associated with ICF are eternally grateful to Alice not only for the leadership and vision she has brought to the Foundation, but for what she has given to the people of Idaho through her commitment to the arts, education, and countless other needs throughout the state and beyond its borders. Alice Hennessey is one of Idaho's treasures and a true Friend of the Foundation.

most needed, especially in rural Idaho, in communities where there are essentially no philanthropic funds.

\$208,948 Awarded in ICF's Northern Region Competitive Cycle
